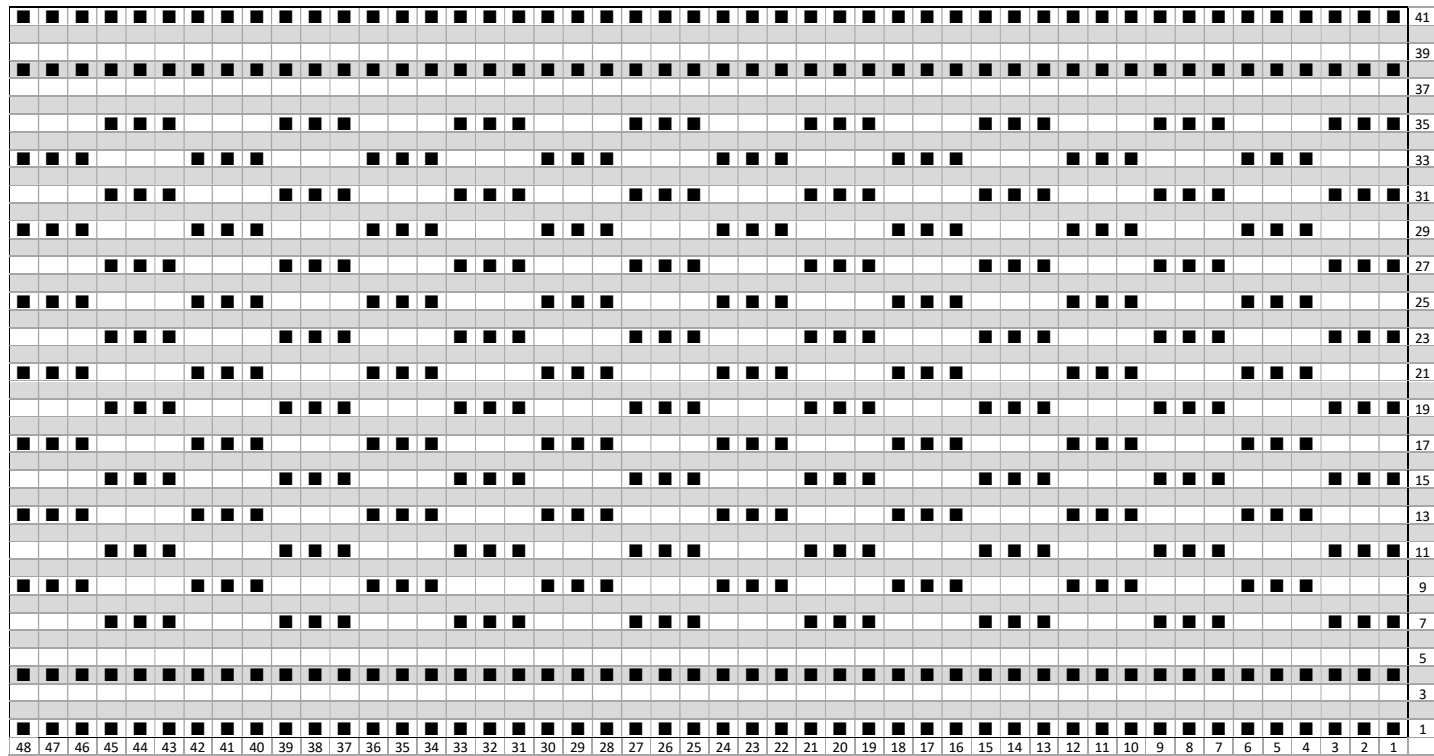


GP31 Gilbert 'Leather' Rook's seeds and bars gansey

Cromer, about 1902

■ = purl stitch on the right side (and knit stitch on the wrong side)

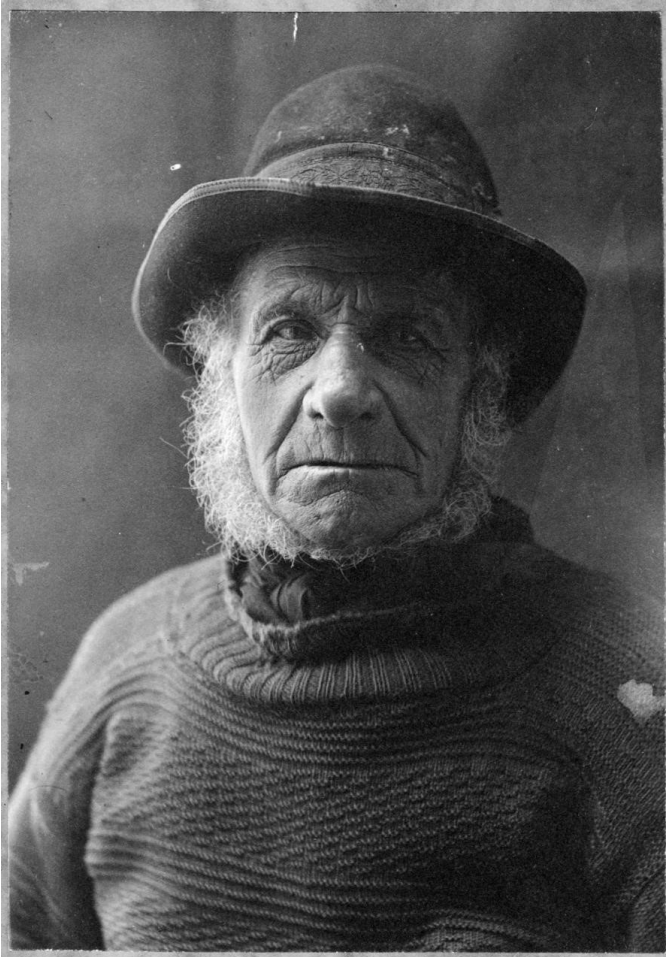

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This gansey has a vast floppy neck and Leather Rook has plugged the gap with a good sized ropper (neckerchief), which is probably black. The seed stitch in the panels is a little unusual, being a k3, p3 combination instead of the usual k2, p2. The bars too are different, having 4 single row rigs, rather than 2 or 3 double rows.

This is knitted with a tension of about 7 spi.

He is wearing a black 'chummy' hat, which was a favourite style at Cromer in the latter part of the 19th century.
