
GP54 Sheringham fisherman #3 Billy West's double meshes and hailstones gansey

 \blacksquare = purl stitch on the right side (knit stitch on the wrong side)




Sheringham, about 1900

CRRMU : CP1753



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There are 8 repeats plus another column of double meshes and (I am guessing) a double seam (like GP100) $(20 \times 8 \text{ repeat}) + 15 \text{ (meshes)} + 5 \text{ (seam sts)} = 180 \text{ sts}$

180 x 2= 360 sts (making 90 ribs)

Estimated tension = 10 spi (like GP52 Jack Martins) if the gansey is 36 inches.

Sampler by Val Smith, knitted before a change of mind about the number of stitches in the meshes columns. This version has an extra knit-stitch, either side of the meshes. Reconsideration of the photograph says the meshes fill the columns to the very edge (see the chart above).



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
